The applicant needed a flood overlay at the property.

As a referral authority NEC-MA objected to the permit being granted because in the event of a one in 100 year flood "it is likely that the entire location

would be subject to inundation from Fifteen Mile Creek".

The property already has established infrastructure for horse training and breeding, including stables and horse swim.

Councillor Rozi Parisotto said council had no choice but to abide by NECMA's ruling.

"We basically become a rubber stamp to another authority and it makes it difficult for council to make decisions when so much of the power of local government has been removed," she said.

Transport company fined \$74k

A COROWA transport company has ers received in court last month. been fined \$74,500 after 17 of its drivers broke laws designed to keep them off the road when they are fatigued.

VicRoads prosecuted Gaolone Pty Ltd in the Wangaratta Magistrates' Court on Wednesday, following an audit of work diaries from May 2010 in the company's Corowa office.

Gaolone Pty Ltd was convicted of 50 charges including having employees drive more hours than legally allowed, not having long enough rests and making false entries in work diaries.

The fine was exactly five times the total fine of \$14,900 that 15 of its driv-

The company was also placed on a six-month good behavior bond.

Magistrate Susan Armour said the penalty will serve as a warning to other transport companies that allow employees to drive while fatigued.

The VicRoads audit was only the third of its type since new legislation was brought in two years ago.

VicRoads prosecutor Anthony Murdoch said it is particularly important for transport companies to be deterred from breaking the laws given the high number of fatalities that occur on country roads.
